CHOOSE YOUR QUANTITY

25 50 75 100 125 150 175 200

Remember to order your suites by the number of households instead of the number of guests.

I also recommend ordering a few extras just in case you have a few late add ons.

It is much more expensive to order a small quantity later!

CHOOSE YOUR PAPER

These uncoated stocks have a wonderful, smooth feel to them. The 120# is the most affordable to print on but it is still nice and thick to wow your guests.

The cotton stocks have a soft, luxurious texture.

Cotton papers elevate the elegance of your invitations to the next level.

CHOOSE YOUR PRINTING METHOD

DIGITAL

Digital printing takes the design and prints it on a flat surface creating a smooth image with no impression in the paper. It is the most affordable option and is available on all paper stocks.

LETTERPRESS

Letterpress printing uses a specially made plate of our design that is inked and pressed into the paper to create a recessed print that you can see and feel. It is the more expensive option because of its luxurious texture, and is only available on our cotton stocks.

INVITATION WORDING

The wording for your invitation can be as formal and traditional, or as casual and relaxed as you want, I want it to reflect you and your wedding! Keep in mind that invitations tend to look a bit cluttered if there are more than 10-12 lines of text. If you are having trouble making your decision, please email me for some resources.

The introduction line of the invitation is usually where it would be indicated who is hosting the wedding, however, a lot of modern weddings have either the bride and the groom paying for the wedding or multiple parties helping out with hosting so, there are plenty of other introduction lines that aren't quite as traditional.

Just like when you are addressing envelopes, the dates and times on the invitation are spelled out formally on the invitation. mr. and mrs. james smith request the honor of your presence at the marriage of their daughter

RSVP WORDING

The wording for your reply card is completely up to you! This is just a suggestion but there are plenty of creative and alternative ways to word your reply card.



The reply date should be about a month prior to the wedding to give your vendors enough time to plan.

This would also be a great space to have guests choose their entree if you are planning a sit down dinner.

DETAILS CARD WORDING

The wording for your details cards really depends on what additional information you want to convey to your guests. Try and think about what you would want to know if you were a guest at your wedding!

Some things you might consider:

- hotel information for out of town guests
- website information

- other weekend events
- directions to the venue
- any quirky, but pertinent details about your venue

Thary

Mary is the classic modern calligraphy style, it's not too casual, but not too formal. It is a little more uniform than the rest but still modern and fun.

Poppy

Poppy is a little more abstract and free flowing. There will probably be some overlapping with delicate flourishes but still legible and special.

Caroline

Caroline is dressed up a bit, and is a fancier take on the modern style. There will be larger flourishes that will overlap with other letters, but it will be legible and elegant.

Any

Amy is the most casual style in the group. More upright and free, it gives off a cool handwriting vibe which is perfect for many occasions. Think of Amy as the fun sister of the bunch!

ENVELOPES AND ADDRESSING

Adhering to traditional etiquette when addressing your wedding envelopes can seem outdated, but I like to think people enjoy getting mail with their formal name written on it in beautiful calligraphy.

Here are some of the simple rules that you may want to consider.

GUEST ADDRESSING

Most etiquette guidebooks would suggest that you should avoid using abbreviations on the guest's addresses on the outer invitation envelope. Some common examples are: writing out "Road" instead of "Rd.", "Apartment" instead of "Apt.", and "Massachusetts" instead of "MA". You may also consider writing out "and", however I think a pretty "&" looks great too.

GUEST NAMES

As with the addresses on the outer envelope of your invitations, the guest's names should also be written out formally. You should also consider using appropriate social titles as well, such as "Mr. and Mrs." for married couples. Don't forget to double check your list for any doctors! Any name with a suffix "Mr. John Smith Jr." should be noted as well.

REPLY CARD ADDRESSING

Traditionally, reply card envelopes are addressed and stamped so that the guest can easily pop the reply card in the mail. The address is typically just the address of the host (no names necessary) however, this can be the address of anyone who might volunteer to collect the rsvps!
